World Trade out of Order? – The Struggle of Rebalancing Trade between China, the EU and the U.S.

75 years ago, the Bretton Woods Agreement established a new international monetary system during the "golden age" of multilateralism and economic cooperation. Even though the Bretton Woods institutions have been remarkably resilient over time, multilateralism and specifically multilateral trade agreements are facing a severe crisis. Rising protectionism and bilateralism, the ongoing trade war between the world's two largest economies, tariff disputes between the U.S. and the EU, as well as the deep crisis of the WTO's internal courts are bringing the system that has been in place for three quarters of a century to the brink of collapse. A real threat to the multilateral order seems to be the blockage of nominating new judges to the WTO's internal courts by the U.S. administration. New judges need to be approved by the end of the year, otherwise the court cannot hear new cases and thus ceases to function as a mediator. So, where do we go from here? „Tear down this wall“: 30 Jahre nach dem Mauerfall

Zeitzeugengespräch mit Dr. Peter Brinkmann, Journalist, u.a. Korrespondent in der DDR für die BILD während der Wendezeit, nahm als Fragesteller an der legendären Maueröffnungs-Pressekonferenz mit Günter Schabowski teil; Peter Claussen, von 1987 bis 1990 Diplomat in der Kulturabteilung der US-Botschaft in Ost-Berlin

In diesem Jahr jährt sich der Mauerfall in Berlin zum 30. Mal. Mehr als ein Vierteljahrhundert war die Mauer Symbol des Ost-West-Konfliktes und der Teilung Deutschlands. Mit einer Gesamtlänge von rund 155 km umgrenzte die Berliner Mauer Westberlin. Sie wurde im Osten als „Friedensgrenze“ und „Antifaschistischer Schutzwall“ gepriesen und im Westen als „kommunistische Schandmauer“ verdammt. Der Fall der Berliner Mauer am 9. November 1989 markierte das Ende des Kalten Krieges und ist zugleich fest mit der Deutschen Einheit verbunden.

Die turbulente Zeit im Herbst 1989, die durch erfolgreichen Widerstand und Bürger*innenmut geprägt wurde und die DDR in eine offene Krise stürzte, wird von Zeitzeug*innen anhand ihrer Erlebnisse und persönlicher Eindrücke nochmals erfahrbar gemacht. Berichten wird u. a. Diplomat Peter Claussen, der von 1987 bis 1990 in der Kulturabteilung der US-Botschaft in Ost-Berlin arbeitete und am 4. Holding the Rock: Occupation Alcatraz

Interactive Lecture with LeAndra Nephin, Board of Directors for the Omaha Tribal Historical Research Project and Board Member for Beyond the Spectacle-Native North American Presence in Britain

In a dramatic siege, Native American activists rallied and took over Alcatraz, declaring the island “Home of the Free Indian Land” – a witty play on the discovery of „empty“ America and an open criticism on the government’s treatment of their land rights justified by the Sioux Treaty of 1868. Starting just days before Thanksgiving on November 20, 1969, the media was abuzz for 19 months with stories of the reclaiming “the Rock” protests, with celebrities such as Marlon Brando and Jane Fonda voicing their support. In this talk, LeAndra Nephin will have a close look on past events and evaluate how they have impacted the present. What is the relationship between Native Americans and the U.S. like today and have defining protests such as the occupation of Alcatraz not just made a mark, but also a difference? – 5.00 euros, reduced 3.00 euros, DAZ members free.

To Keep and Bear Arms? Guns, Gun Control, and Mass Shootings in the U.S.

Teacher Training with Dr. Markus Hünemörder, University of Munich.

This teacher training will examine the debates on gun ownership, gun control, and gun violence in the U.S. with a special focus on the mass shootings in schools and public places that American society has been afflicted with for years. Why is opposition to gun control so adamant? What solutions and measures have been proposed and could any of them work?

Head-to-Head: A Meeting of Inspired Minds Undercover in North Korea

Suki Kim, Writer, and Holtzbrinck Fellow, The American Academy in Berlin

Suki Kim is the only person ever to have conducted undercover immersive journalism in North Korea. Born and raised in South Korea, now based in New York, she traveled to Pyongyang for the first time in 2002, joining and writing about a Kim Jong-il loyalist group. She returned regularly to North Korea for a decade-long investigation, reporting on North Korean defectors and witnessing events from Pyongyang such as Kim Jong-il's 60th birthday celebration and his death nine years later. In 2011, she spent six months undercover as an English teacher living in a locked compound of a military guarded all-male university for Pyongyang's future leaders where she gained unparalleled insight into the psychology of North Korea's elite. In this talk, Suki Kim discusses the country's recent history, as well as the book, *Without You, There Is No Us: Undercover among the Sons of North Korea's Elite* (2014), that resulted from her unprecedented access and her current work in progress about the consequence of war and the future of North Korea. – In cooperation with The American Academy in Berlin, Evangelisches Bildungszentrum Hospitalhof Stuttgart; generously supported by Robert Bosch Stiftung GmbH, Holtzbrinck Publishing Group, and Berthold Leibinger Stiftung GmbH. – Registration via program@americanacademy.de – Free admission.
